To the Prior

The Very Reverend T. G. Kinsella

In the priory adjacent to the Fenwick school building, and often in the school building itself, is the prior of the "FENWICK TALES." In the priory he is the leader of the Fenwick Fathers. Almost all the Fathers know him from previous association as their teacher of earlier days, as their director in the House of Studies, and now as the "Prior."

To the students he has become familiar in a series of associations. Most of the students know him as the one whom they met in classes in mathematics on the illnesses of the various Fathers. He has been seen in all the branches of that science from algebra to trigonometry, Freshman to Senior. Every first Thursday brings Father Kinsella to the school in another capacity, as confessor to the students. Events of interest to the students, athletics, the Symposium, Band Concert, and Religious exercises in the gymnasium find Father Kinsella among the Fathers and the students.

As the prior of the local community he is occupied in the administration of temporal and religious activities of the Dominican Order and religious life of the Fenwick Fathers. These administrative functions are the same as those we would recognize in the Medieval ages. They would be the source of no wonder at all to a Chaucer, a Shakespeare, a Medievalist. With a prior, a priest, and a Tale we have a complete modern complement to Canterbury Tales, Fenwick Tales.

Foreword

The Seniors

In the estate left by the class of '47 to succeeding classes may be found traditions, traditions of championships and honors, both scholastic and athletic. This heritage will appear to succeeding generations as next to impossible to approach, much less surpass.

From the first day in the fall of 1943, the class has striven to raise the name of Fenwick to the pinnacle. That they have succeeded is clear to all.

Under the capable leadership of class officers Charles Fox, Ronald Jablonski, Jack Wilson, and Charles Hinni, as freshmen the class started out on the right foot by smashing to an undefeated football season. In their sophomore year the class was led by Charley Fox, Bob Raymond, Tom Leonard, and Jack Wilson.

In '45 Charley Fox, Bill Moore and Jack Wilson, as first stringers, bolstered the squad as it fought its way to the City Title. Boxing finals brought to the front outstanding pugilists Charley Barr, Don O'Reilly, Harold Corda, Fran Parker and Dick Martwick in the preliminaries and Bob McHugh in the finals. In December the juniors of Fr. Malone's religion class presented the annual Amateur Night, collecting \$381, a new high, which was sent to the Boyce, Louisiana, missions.

During the swimming season records fell by the way as Bill Hark, Wally Whalen, Jack Anderson, Jim McMahon, Don Georgeon, and John Kerwin splashed through meet after meet, completing an undefeated season in their senior year.


Representing the class on the debating team were Lou Duerinck, Frank Munger, Jim Wolfe, Bob Kretz, and George Scorby.



This, then, is the heritage left to succeeding generations by the class of '47. It remains for its successors to match it, if they can.





The Juniors

It was early autumn of 1944, when two hundred and fifty prospective freshmen, preparing to take entrance exams, stood gazing in admiration at the trophy case and the halls of Fenwick. Three years later these very same "frosh" have contributed to the winning of additional honors and have established the class of '48 as a worthy successor of its predecessors.

With a step in the right direction, the frosh grid squad completed its schedule without a loss, 54 meriting numerals. Such names as Bill Barrett, Dom Rauzi and Jack Wallace appeared in the lineup. Two years later these same players helped Fenwick win the 1946 Catholic League championship.

In November of its freshman year the class elected Bill Barrett, president, an honor he held also in his sophomore and junior years. Ralph Reetz also was elected an officer for three years, two as treasurer and the other as secretary.

Also in the field of athletics, the junior basketball team was paced by Bill Barrett, Fran Ferone, and Charley Fisher, with Barrett leading the Catholic league juniors in scoring in his junior year. Maintaining the outstanding record of the swimming squad were Mike McGuire, Wally Purcell, Pat Carbon and Tom Kerwin.

In the sophomore year the class underwent a change of moderators when Father C. A. Carosella took over that position when Father J. A. Murtaugh became ill. Under Fr. Carosella's direction the class held the first Junior Prom since 1941.

The class is well represented on the debating team by Vincent Vitullo, Paul Grant, and John Rosemeyer. Heading the WICK staff is Bob Bailey, editor, Vincent Vitullo and Charles Goedert, associate editors, and Tom Kerwin, sports editor.



The Sophomores




Basketball


Freshman prospects like John Lattner, Bob Rigali and Don Weaver gained enough experience this year to prove valuable in the forming of next year's team.

We lost the next four games to DePaul, Loyola, St. George and St. Pats, to end the season.





Swimming




Two consecutive years without a setback is the enviable record of the best of a list of great Fenwick swimming teams.








Radiomen








Amateurs

Addition

The Fenwick Building Fund has progressed rapidly during the past year. Under the direction of Father W. D. Van Rooy, former School principal, and Mr. Hugh E. Mulligan, the drive has progressed more favorably than any other school drive conducted in the Archdiocese. Already, in two years, \$210,000 have been pledged, sixty per cent of which has come from people having no connection whatever with Fenwick.

The project of building the new addition has been furthered also by the inauguration of the new Dollar-a-Month Club. This new method of collecting funds is especially suited for those who cannot make larger donations. This plan also enables the students themselves to participate more actively in the drive. In this plan each contributor is given a book containing 20 coupons, one of which he tears out each month and sends in with his dollar donation.

Besides this new plan, the committee has been canvassing the parishes and among the leaders is St. Catherine's which has donated \$25,000. There are still two large parishes to be canvassed, and together with the coupon books, they will bring the drive much closer to its goal of \$400,000.

Both the Fathers' and Mothers' Clubs have launched drives during the past year to enlist aid for the drive, and under the direction of their moderators, Fathers A. M. Townsend, and J. A. Quinn, they have responded splendidly especially in respect to the Dollar-a-Month Club.

As has been expressed throughout the drive, the new building must be built and is needed as soon as it is possible to build it. During the last three years, hundreds of boys have been turned away because there weren't adequate facilities to accommodate them in the present building, and have had to attend public schools. The only possible solution is the addition, and this must be put up soon.

During April a drive was also inaugurated among the students and signs were put up over the school advertising FFMOP, a secret society, which ceased to be secret when "Fenwick Friars Mile of Pennies" signs took their places. During this drive each student contributed 100 pennies toward the mile (84,480 pennies). This drive proved to be as successful as the drive to have each student contribute a day's pay from his summer job, which was conducted last year.


