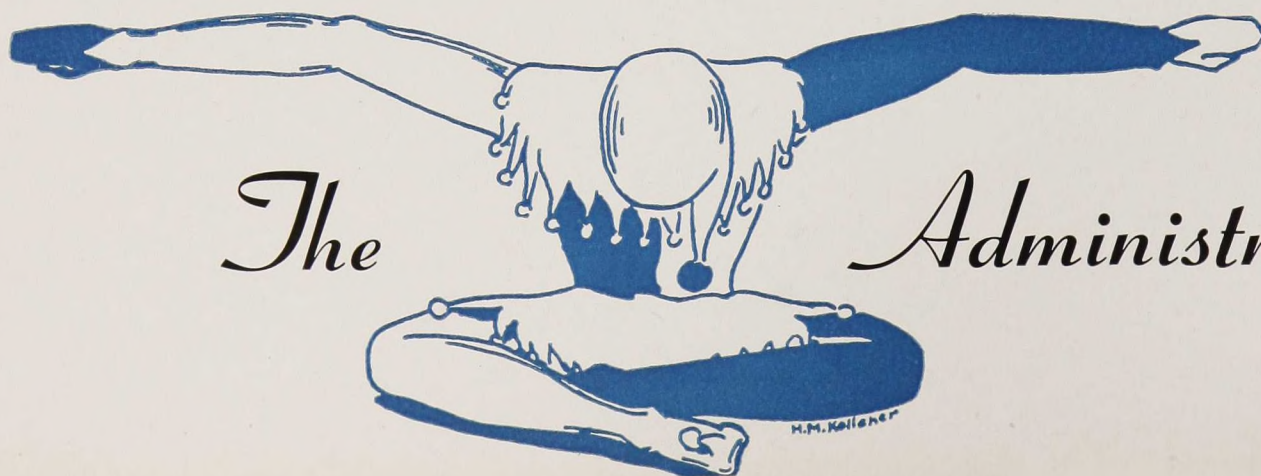
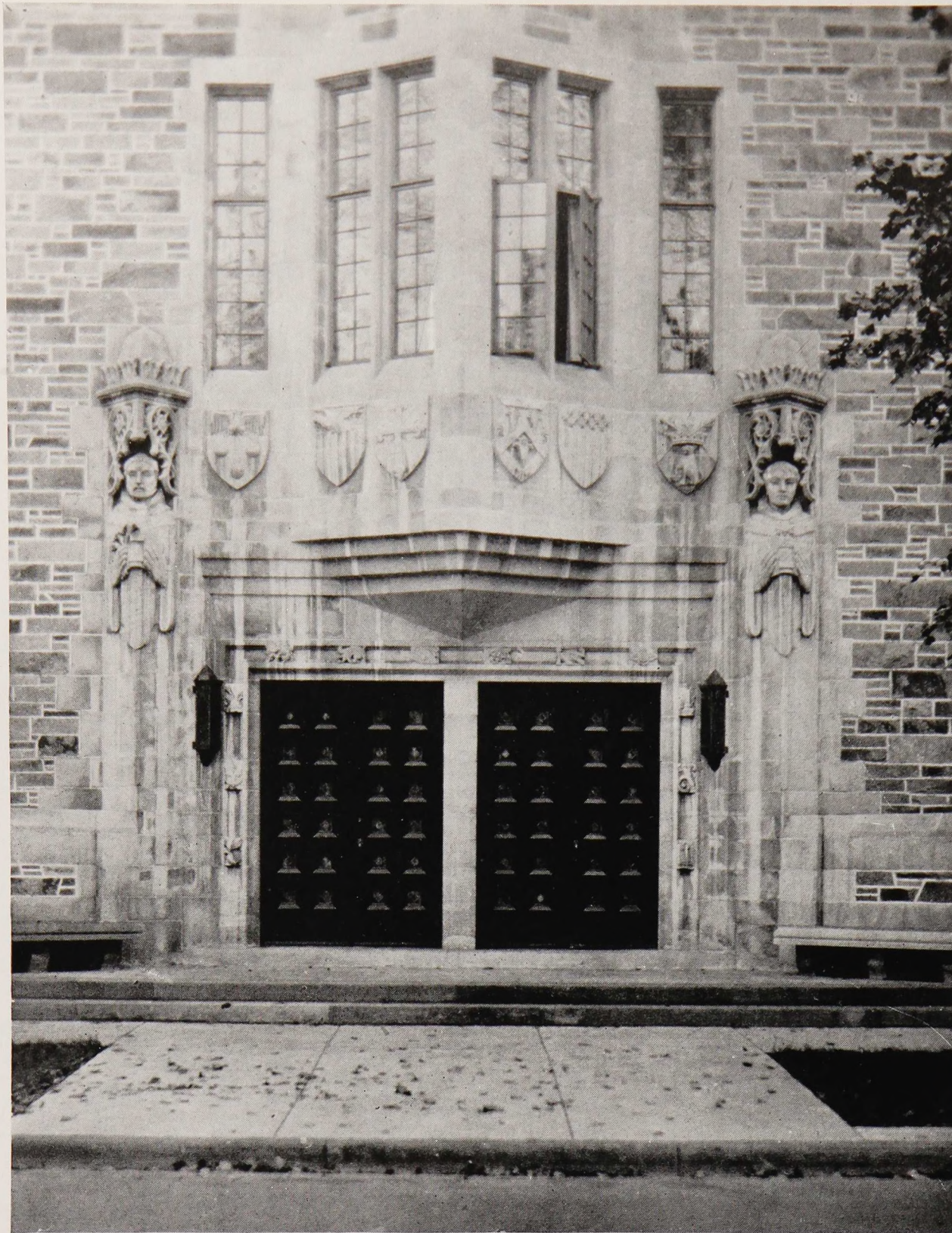
IT KNOWS AND SERVES YOU WELL

As a monument to its unity, the achievements of our school life will stand for many years. Here is a chronicle of our activities during and after school. This is Fenwick — 1948.



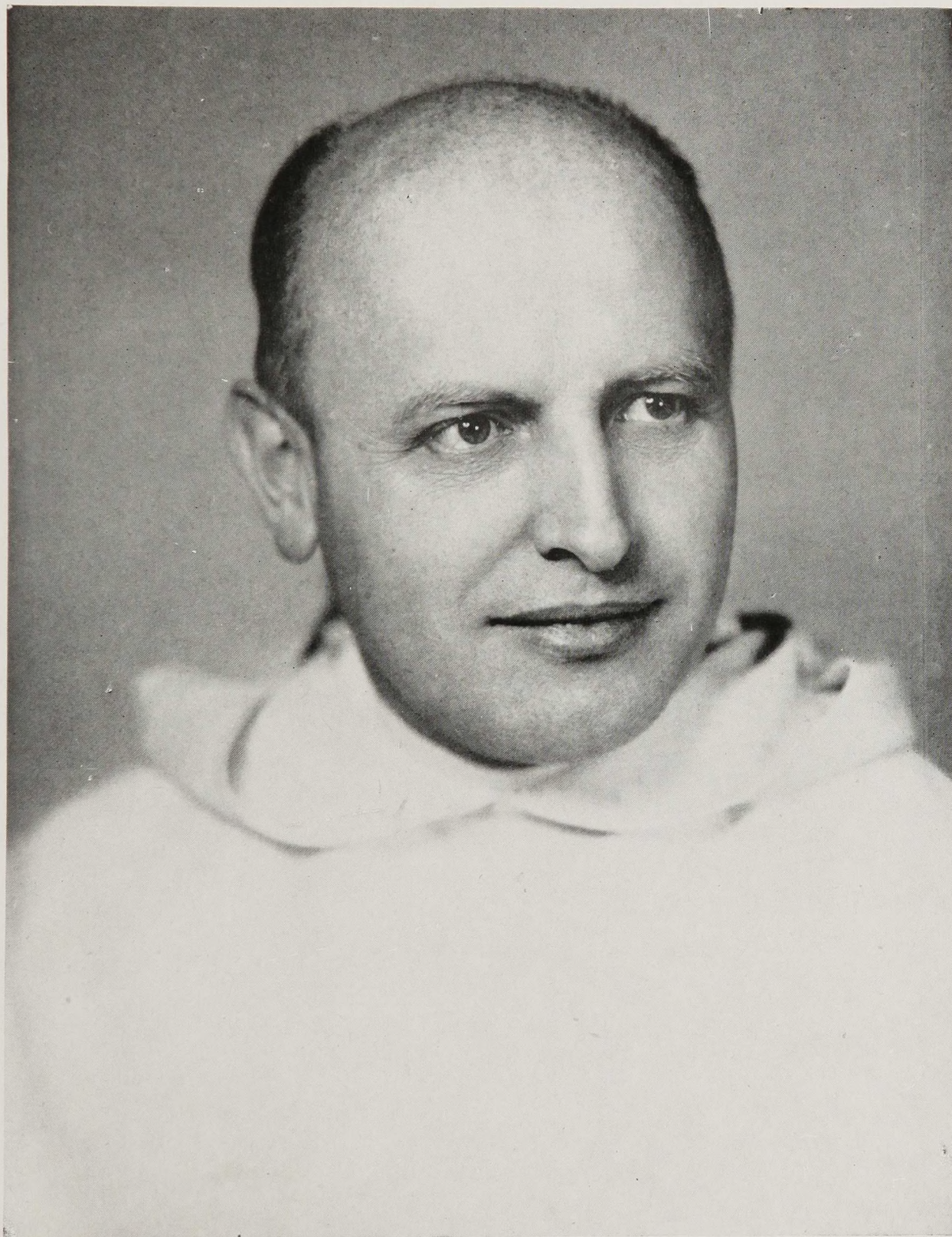

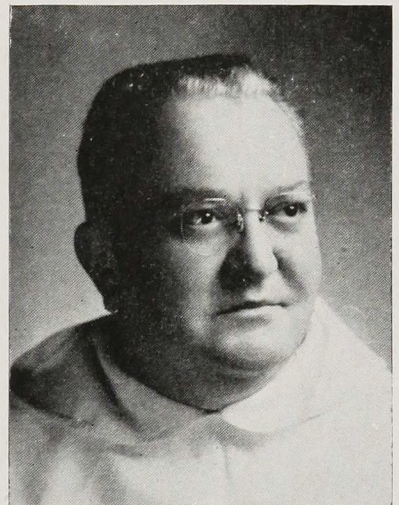
Our Teachers . . .

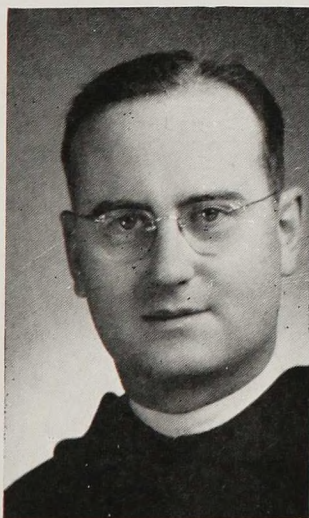

From the start, the work proceeded at a feverish pitch. There were over eighty pictures to be taken, and several hundred lines of copy to be written, with less than a month to prepare the material.

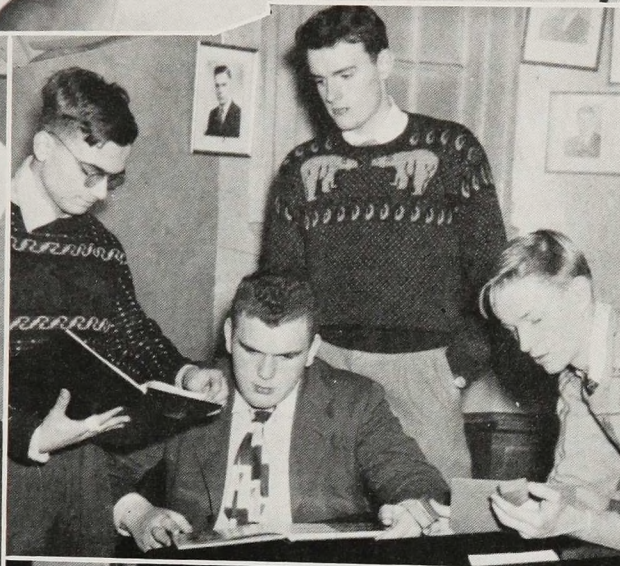
Heaving a final sigh of relief, the staff sent the last section to the printer, to be published in May.

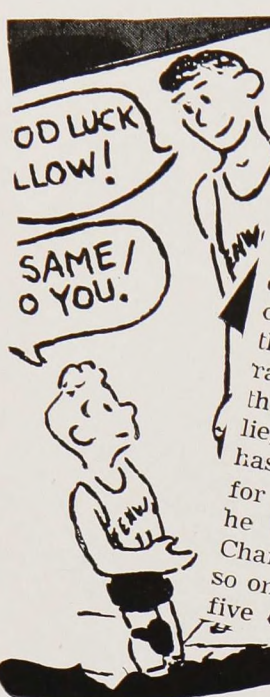

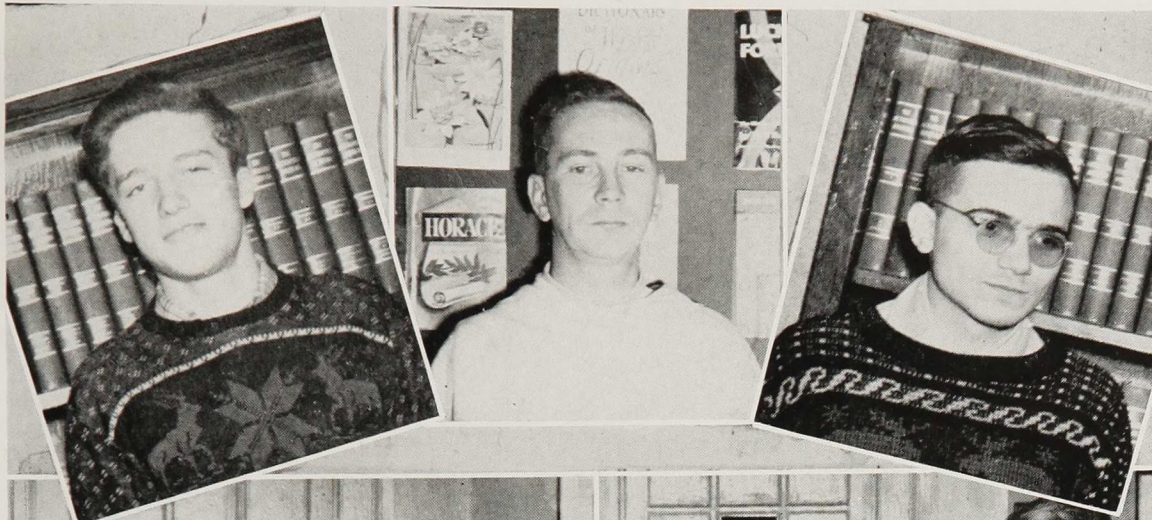
Marking its eighteenth year of publication, the WICK maintained its high standard of newspaper reporting and feature writing.

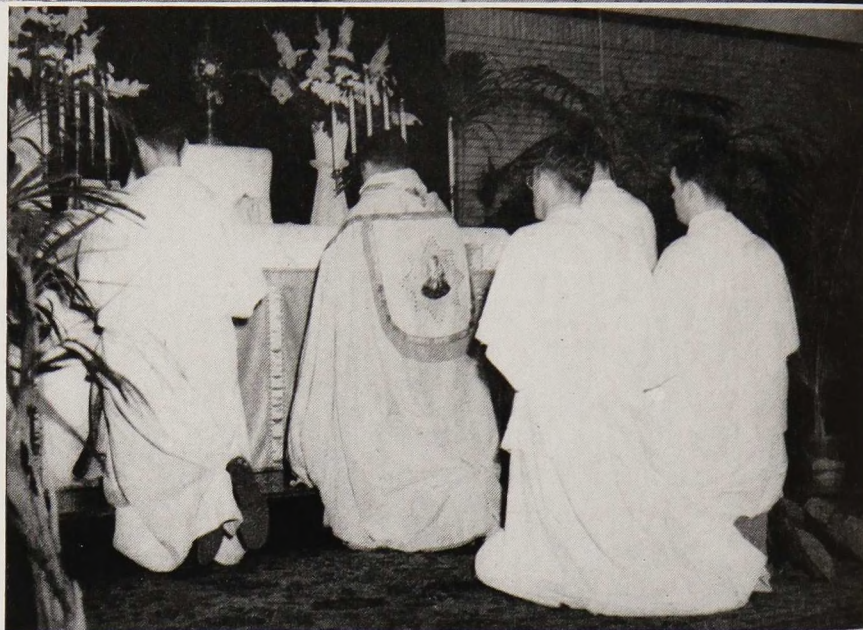

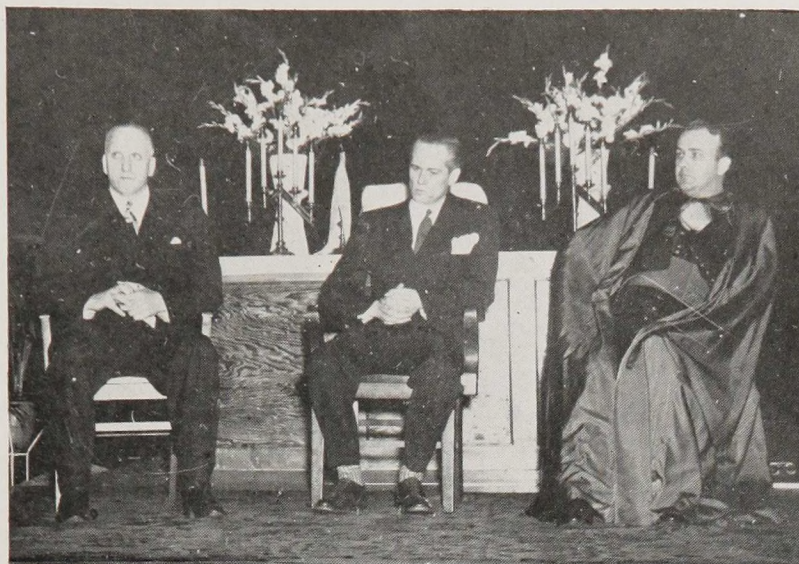

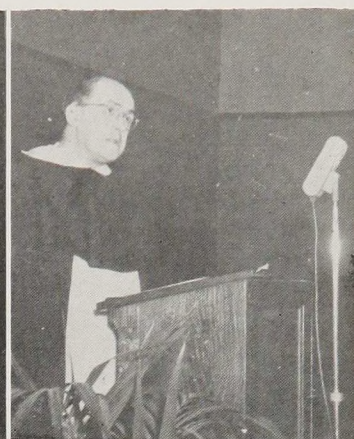

The Radio Club

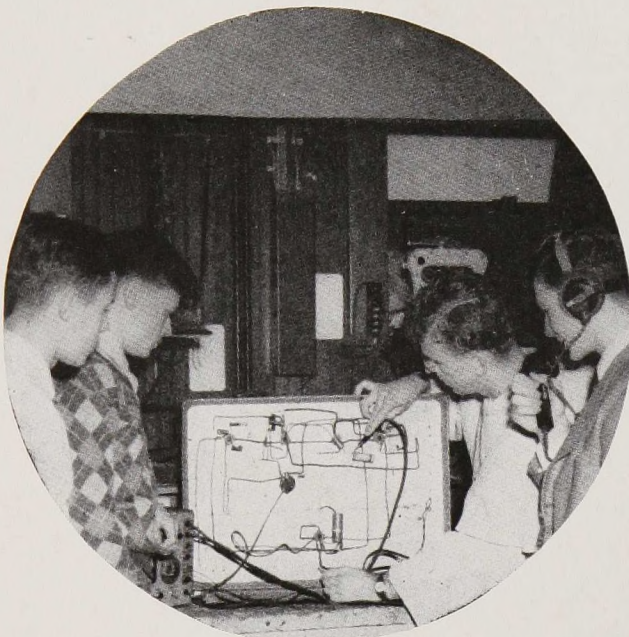

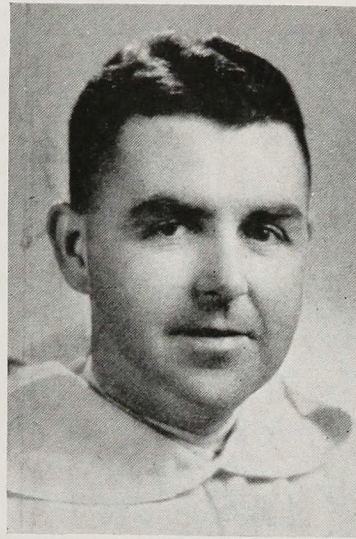
Dramatics

ART FOR ART'S SAKE • • •

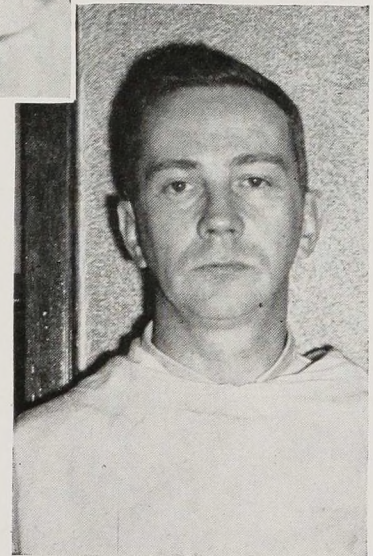

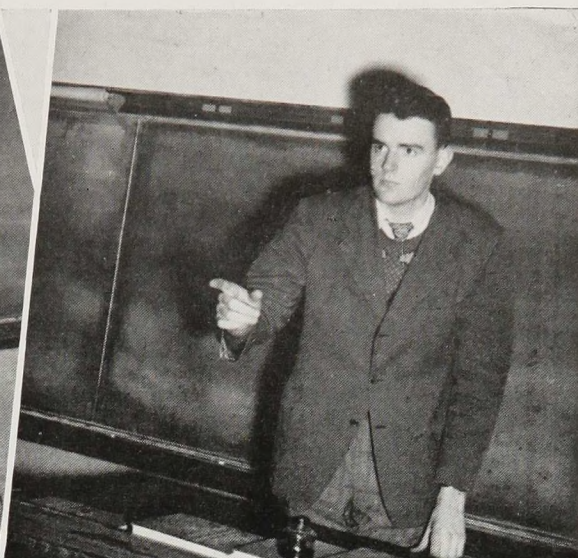
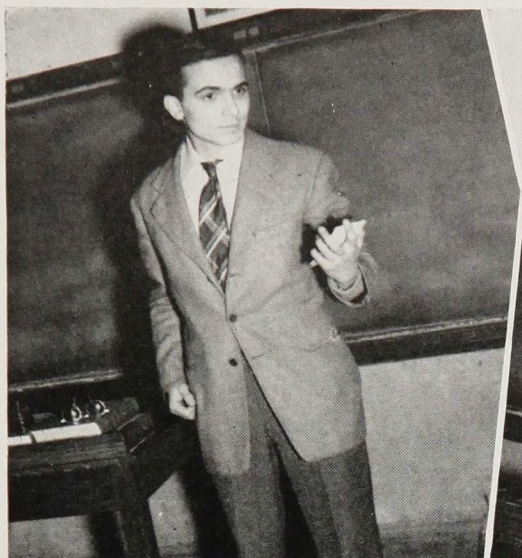

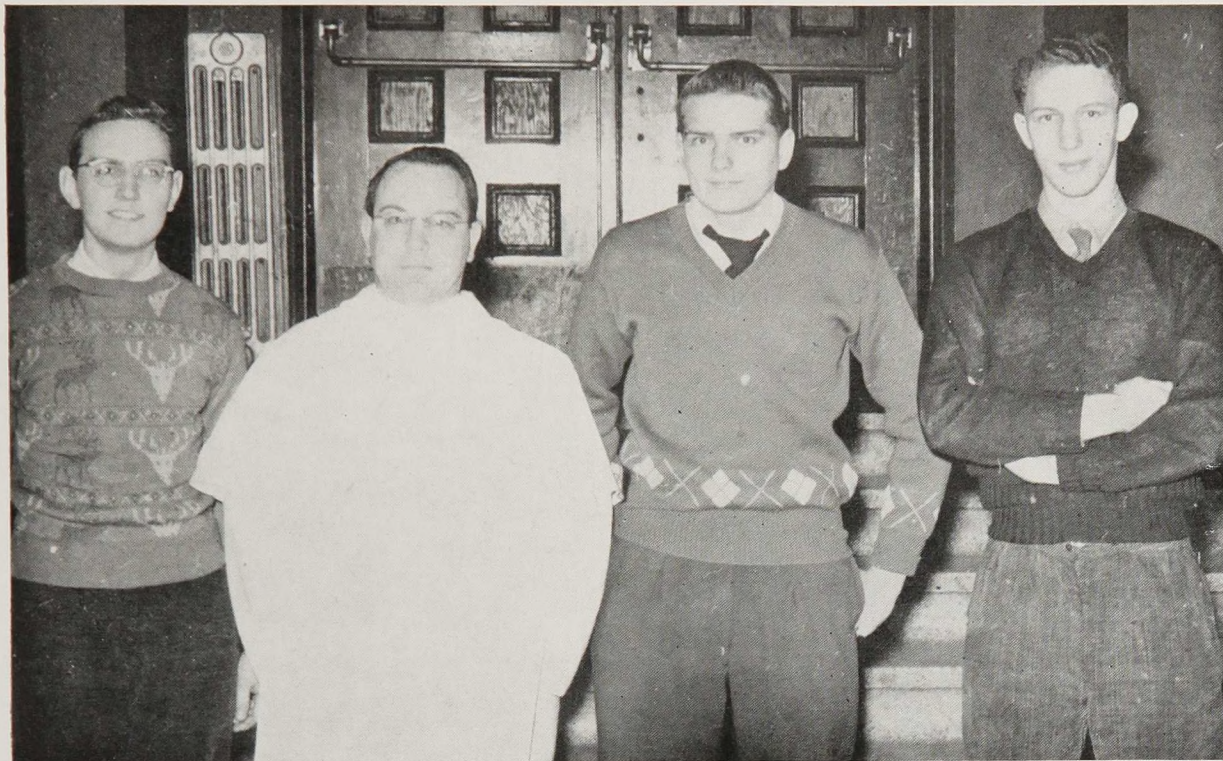

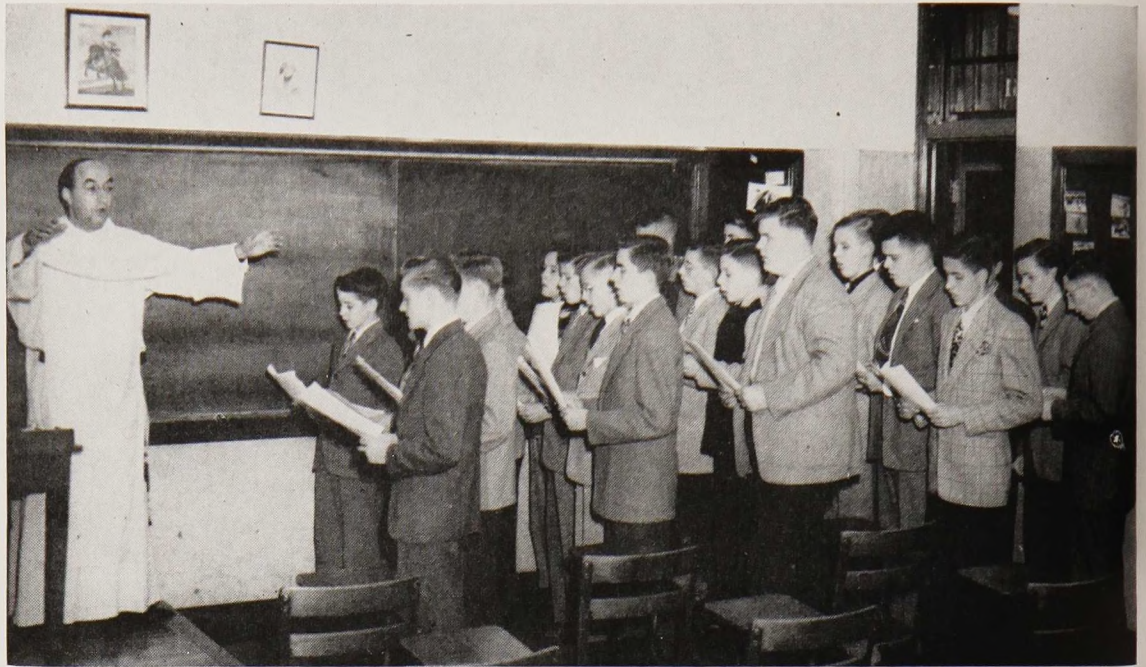

The Club was revived last year after a considerable period of time during which it did not function.

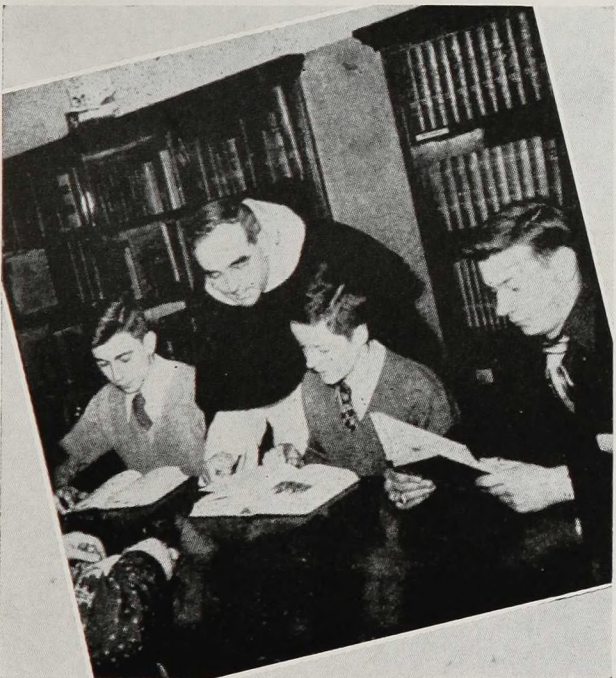
The sizable increase in membership this year gave promise of increased activity for the group in the future.

This was the first time a Master General of the Order had visited Fenwick since 1930, the year following the founding of the school.

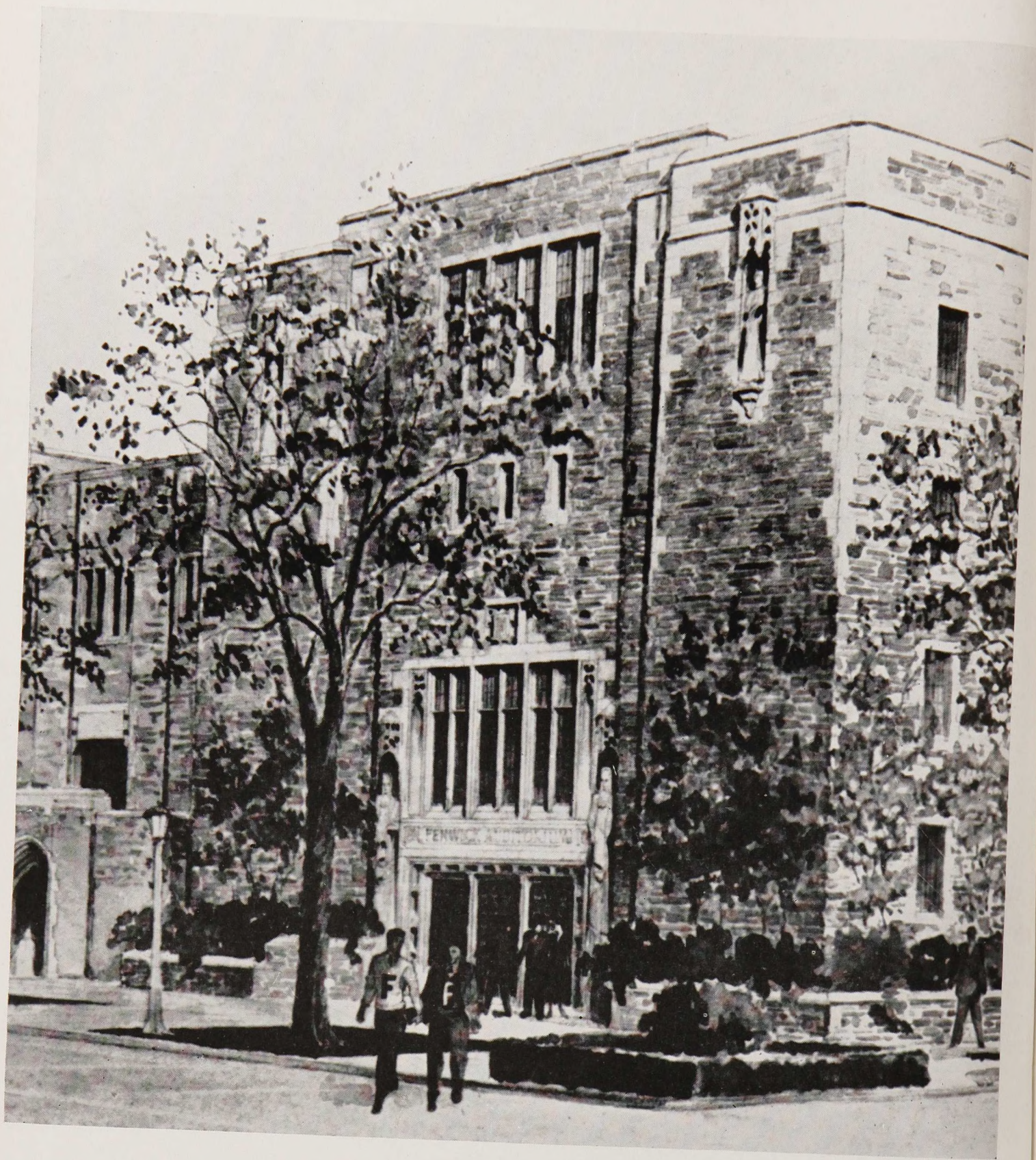


Father Suarez observes the methods of study employed at Fenwick.

The Fenwick Building Drive . . .

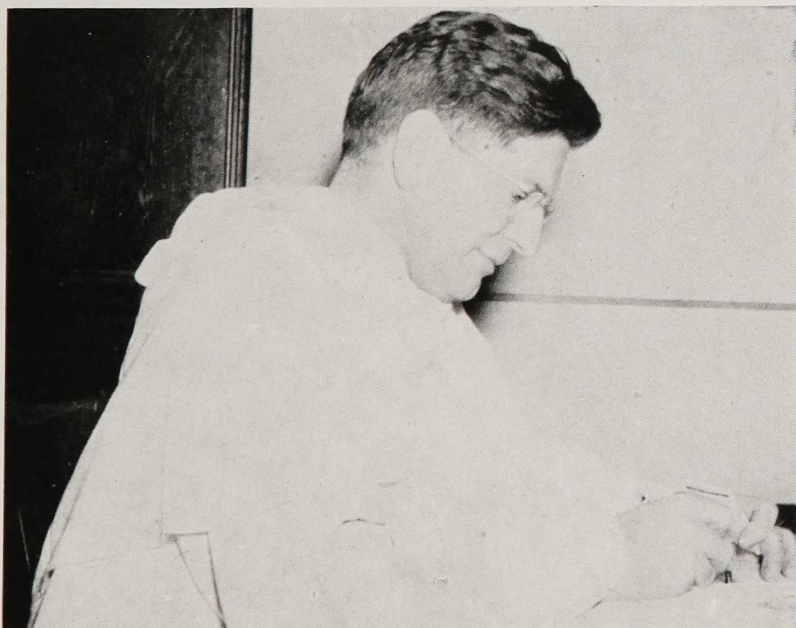
The need for Catholic high school accommodations had already become so critical by the summer of 1945, that the Dominican Fathers, with the approval and encouragement of His Eminence Samuel Alphonsus Cardinal Stritch, began a drive for \$400,000.00 for a large addition to the present Fenwick building.

The Very Reverend Peter O'Brien, O.P., Provincial of the Province of Saint Albert, assigned the Reverend W. D. Van Rooy, O.P., to direct the drive, and Mr. Hugh E. Mulligan consented to act as general chairman.

In August, 1945, collection of funds from all the West Side parishes began. Nearly all the parishes have made contributions by this time, bringing the present total to almost \$300,000.00. The remaining \$100,000.00 must be collected in 1948.

The addition will consist of class rooms on the third floor, a permanent auditorium two stories in height, and a combination study hall and cafeteria in the basement. The new building will be erected on the site of the present priory, and a new priory will be built.

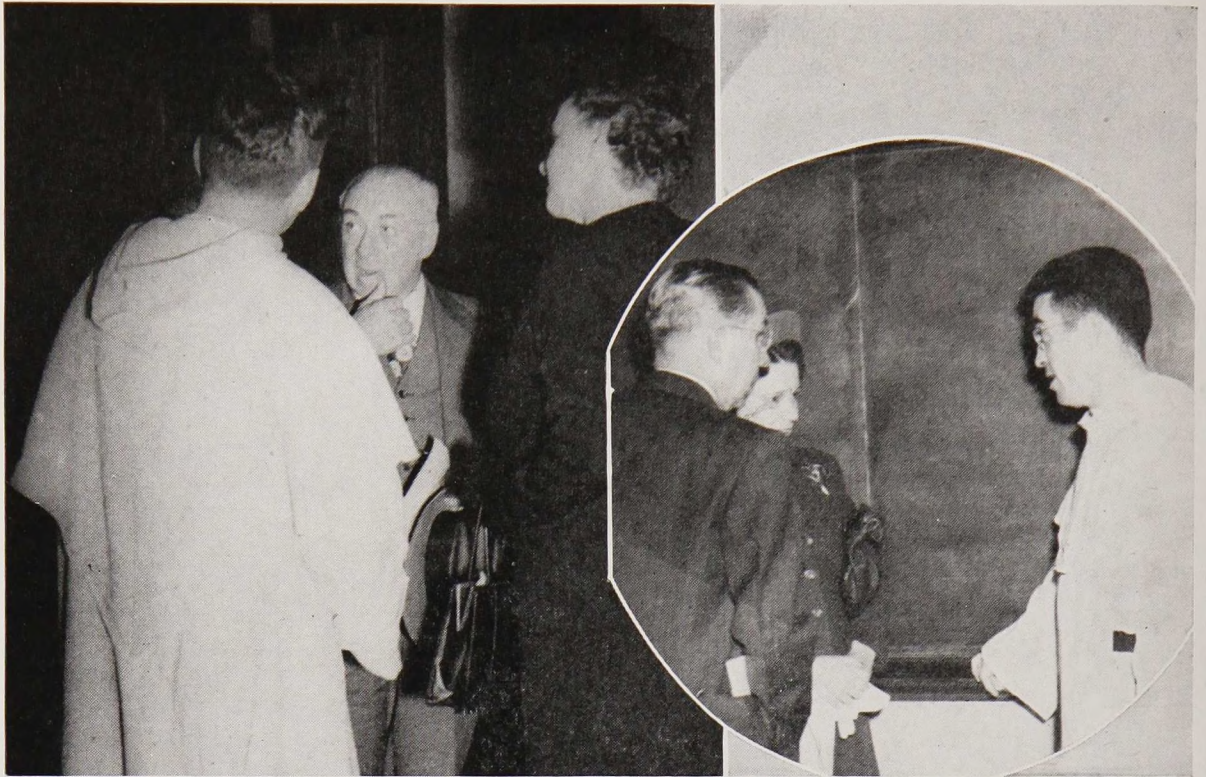
Parents' Night . . .

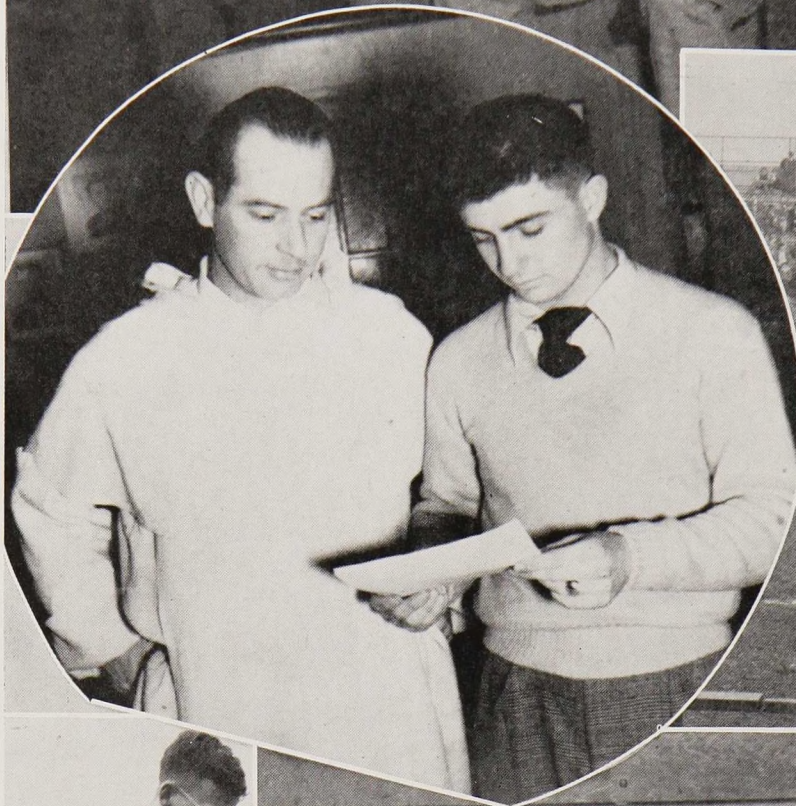

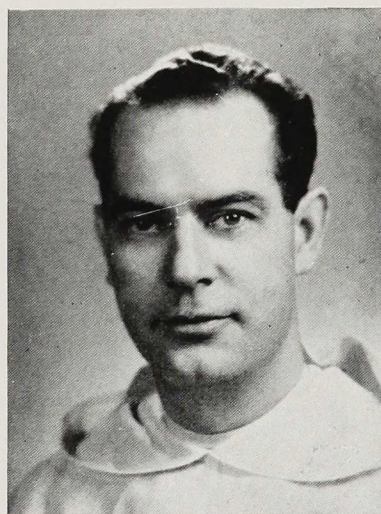
The Cheerleaders

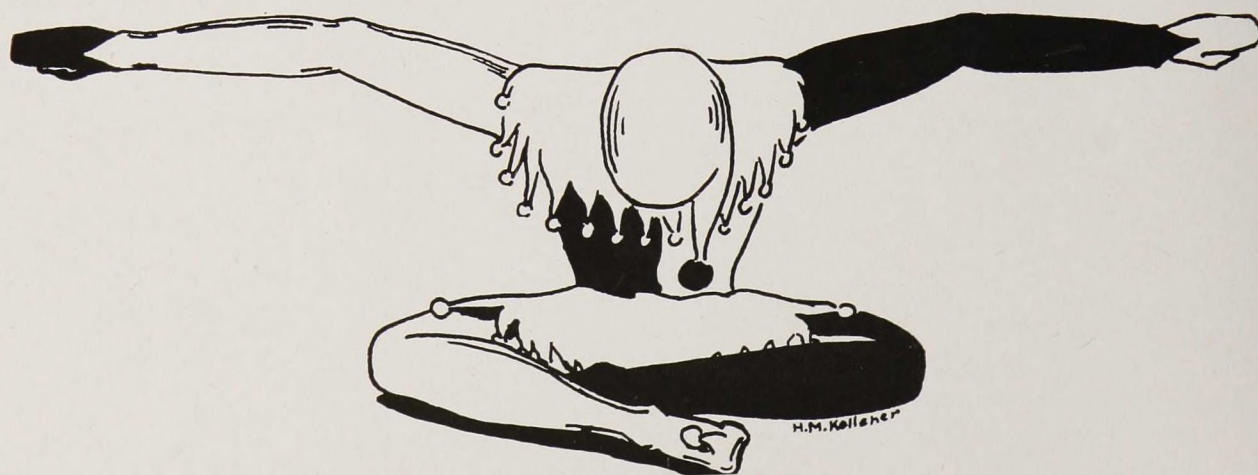

The Year's Athletics

The men in "Black and White" were led by Coach Anthony Lawless and Captain Bill Barrett through a most successful season.

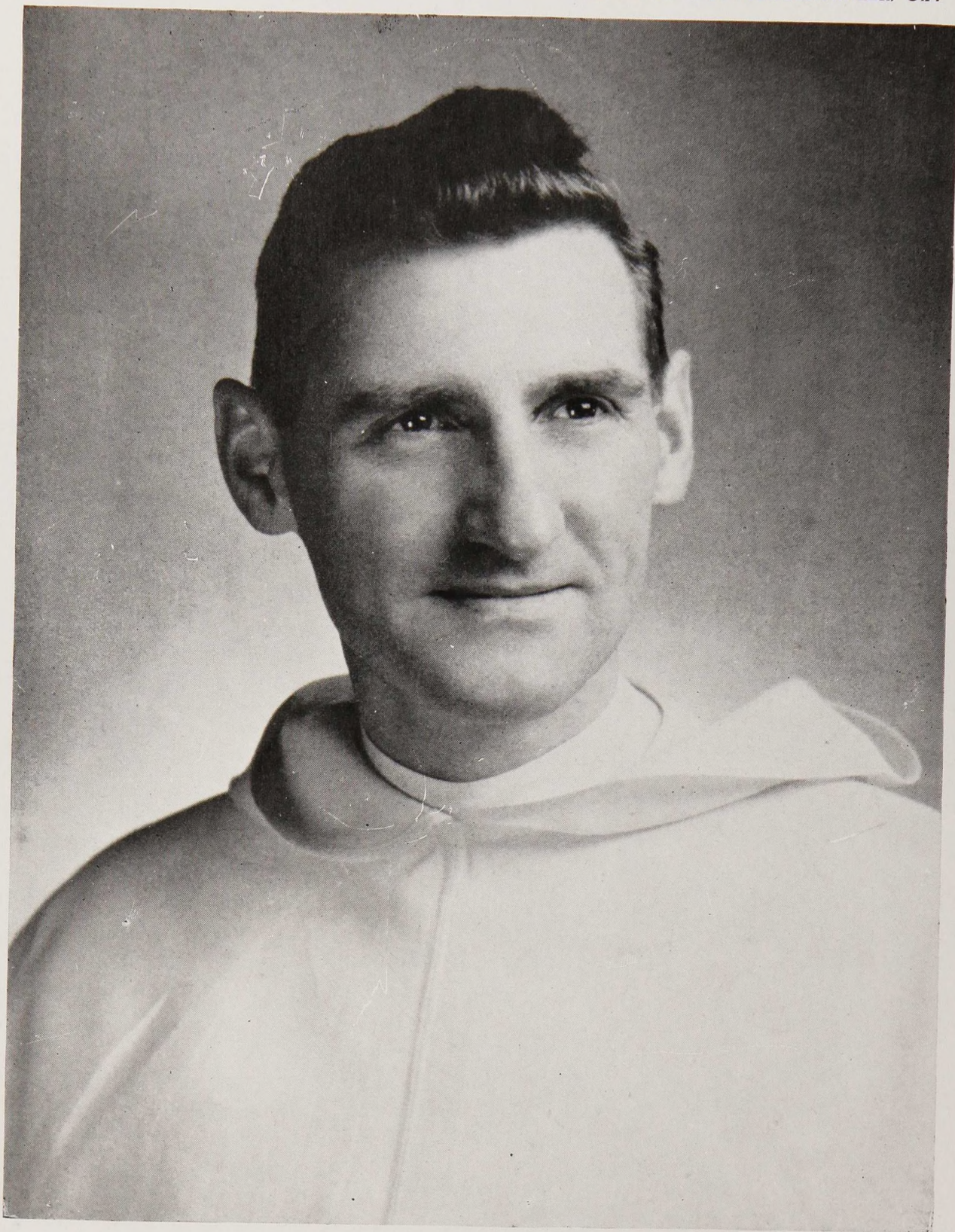

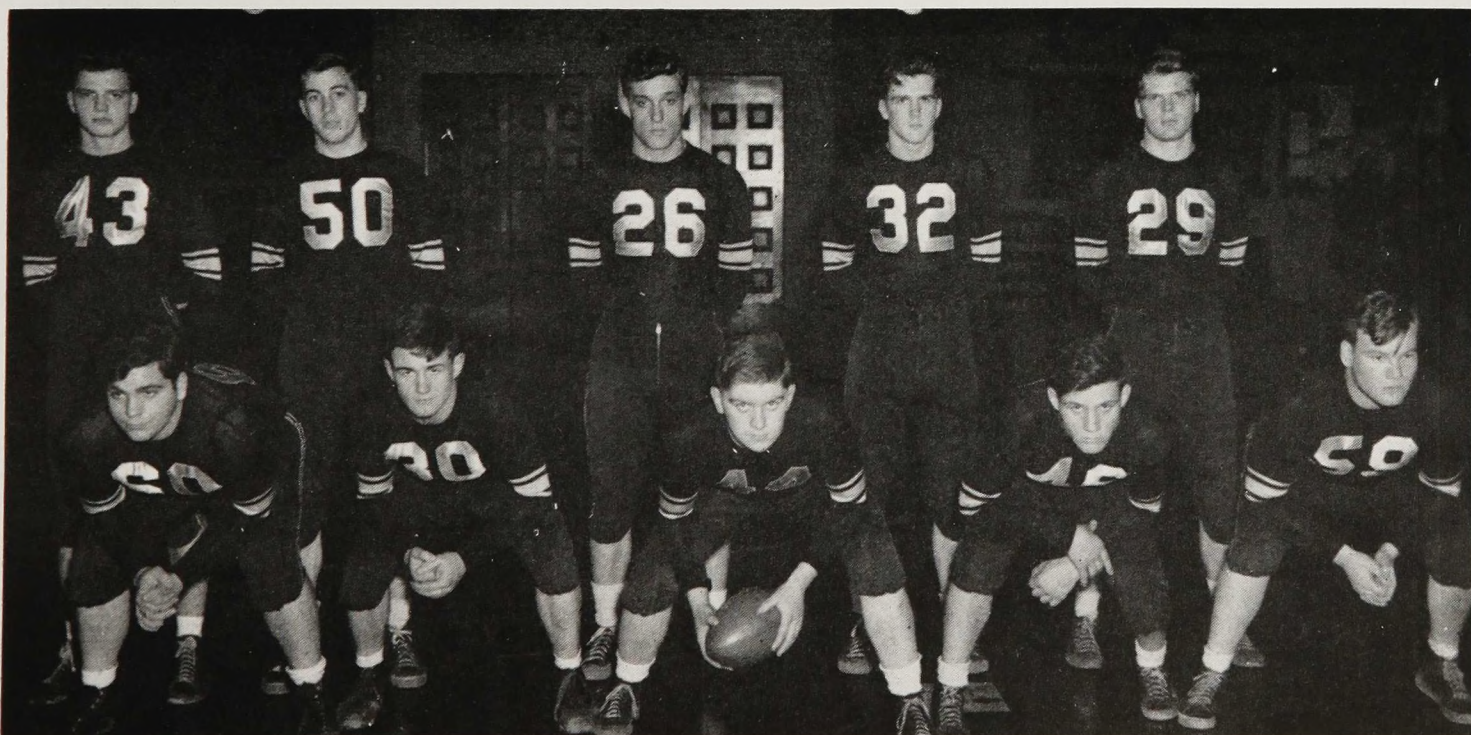

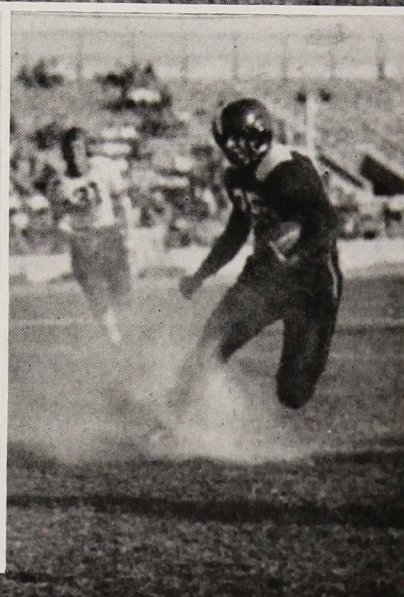

Other backs who gained experience in relief work were Smid, Canty, Workman and Zaucha.

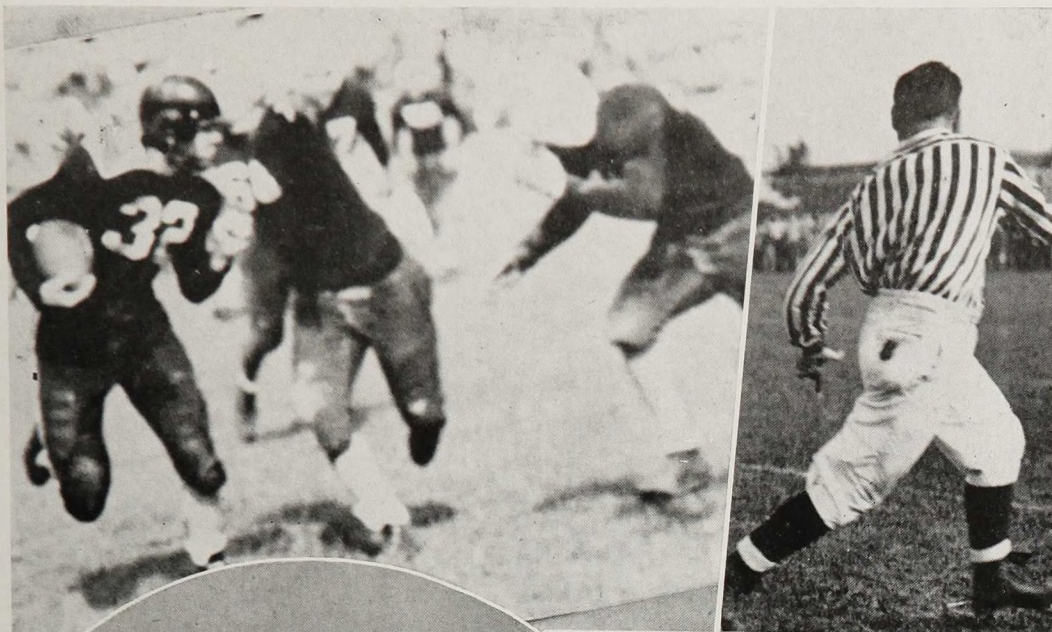

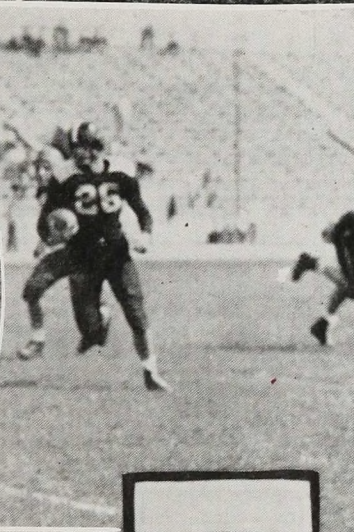

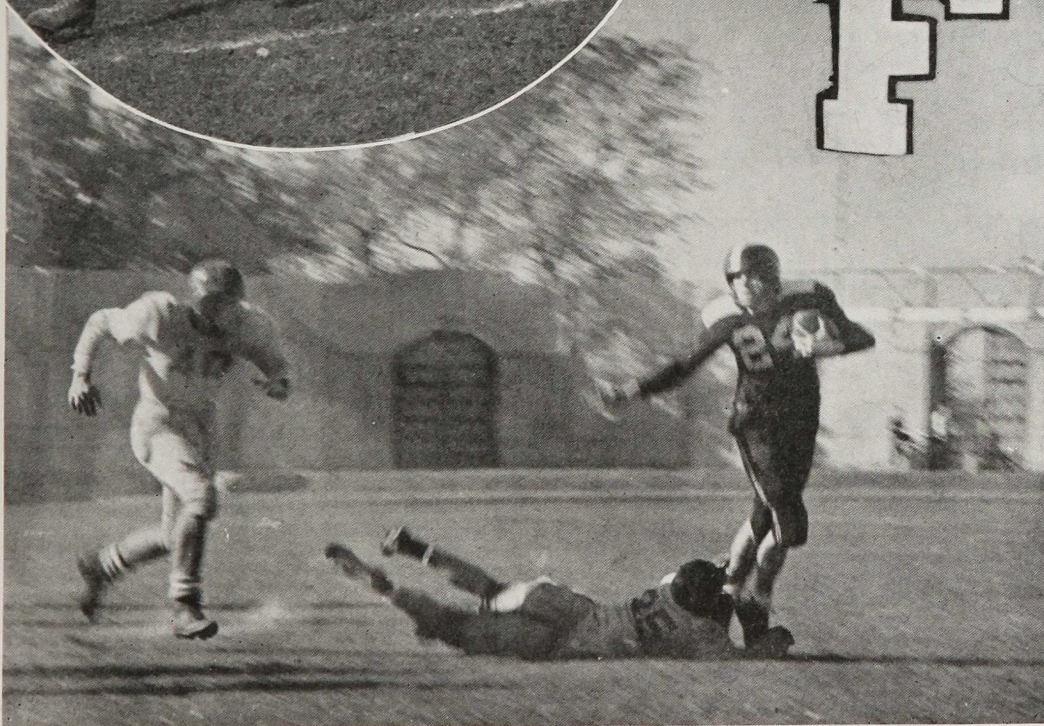
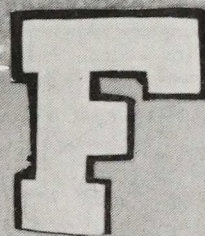

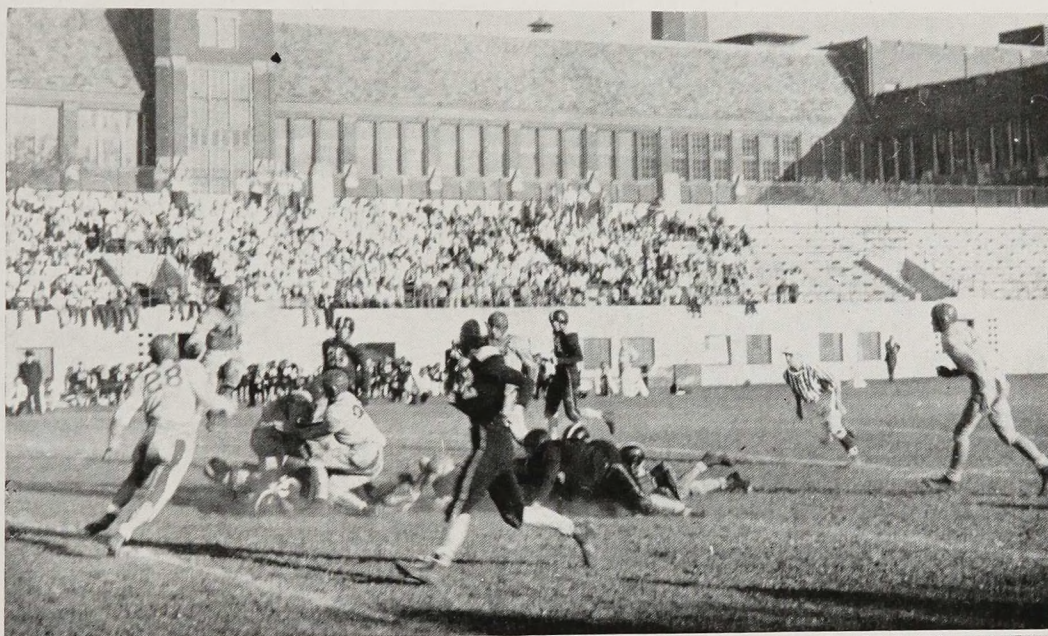

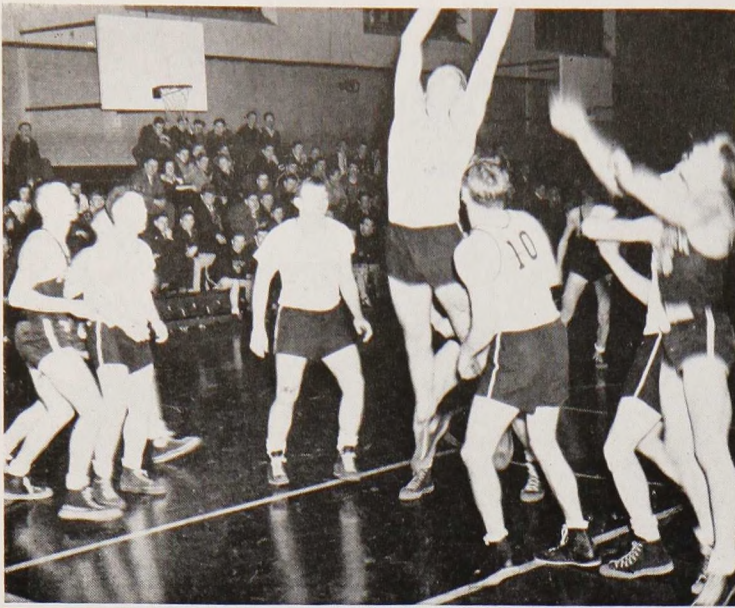

Three wins against eleven losses left the Friars in a tie for sixth place with Holy Trinity in the final League standings.

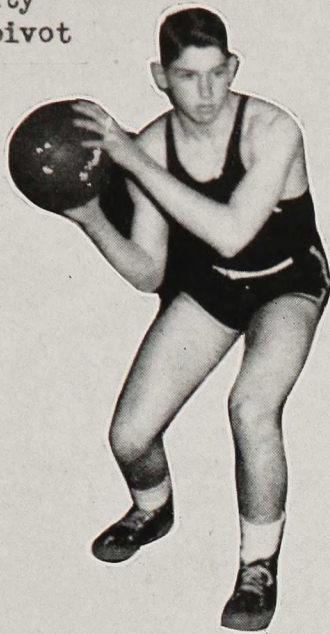

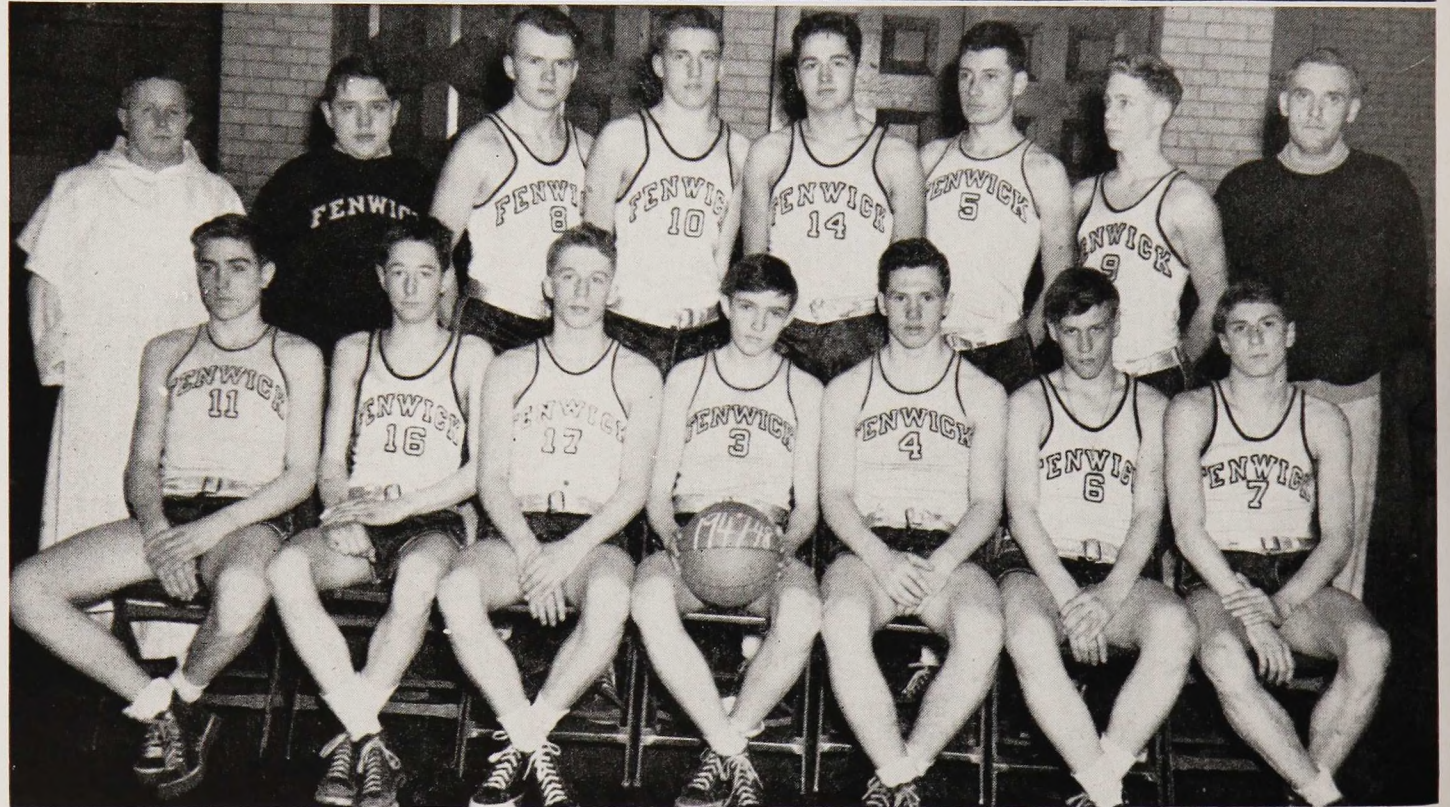

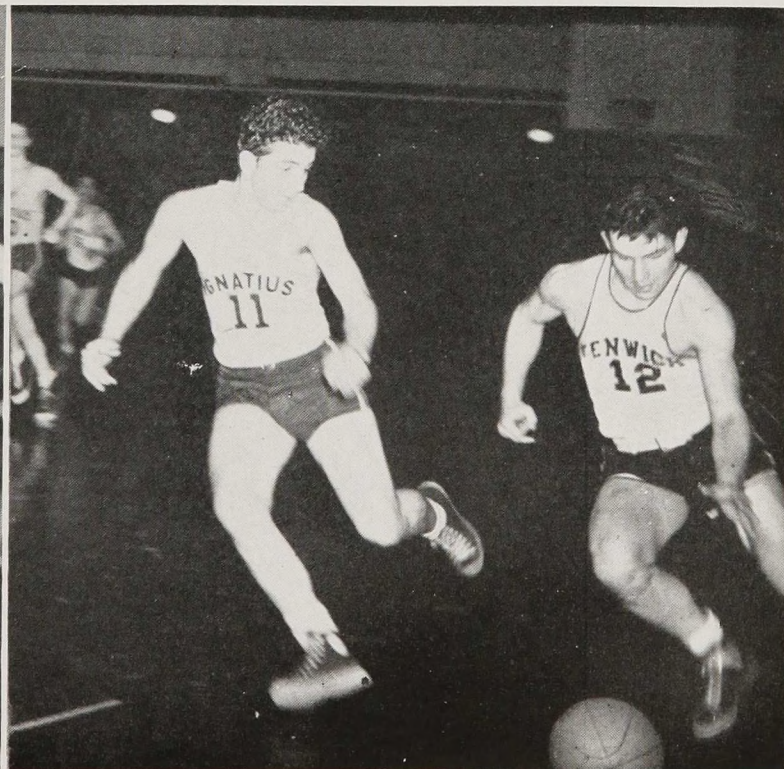

Following in the footsteps of their illustrious predecessors, the swimming team once again showed why Fenwick's tanksters are ranked with the finest high school teams in the Mid-West.

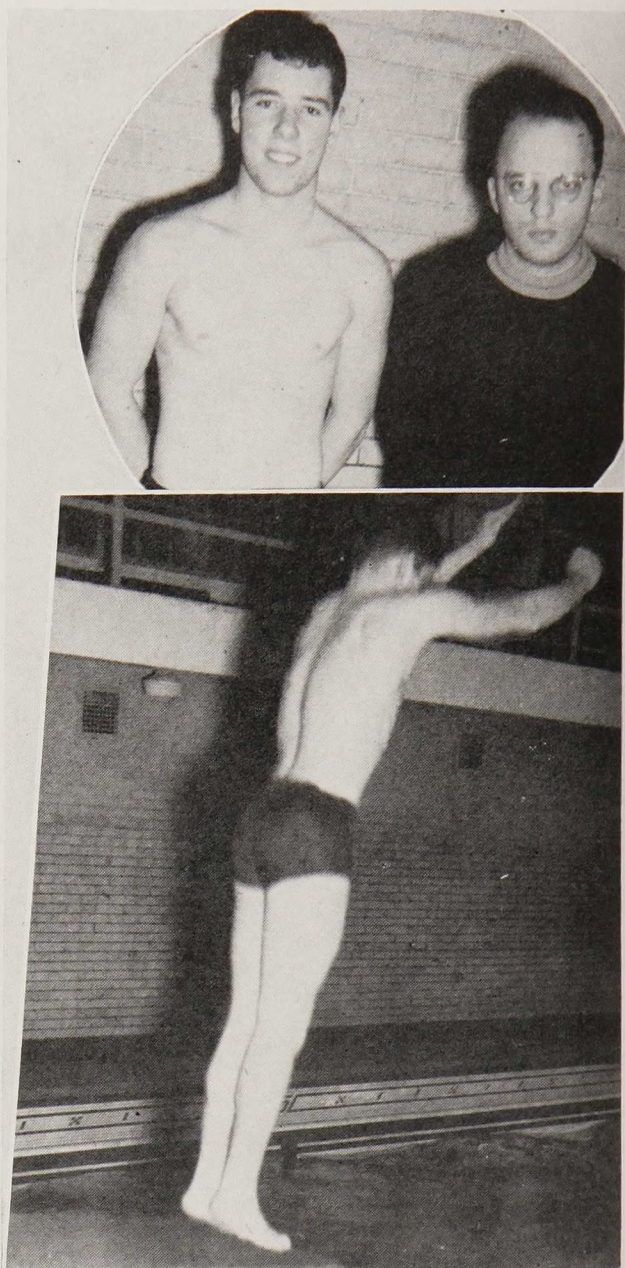

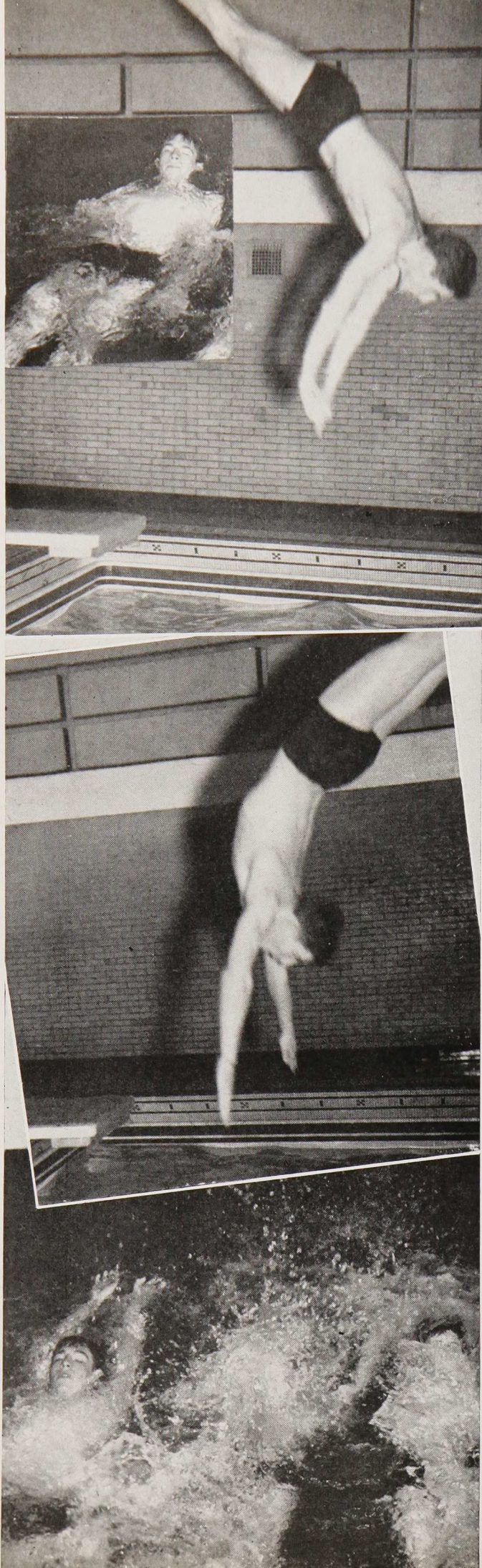

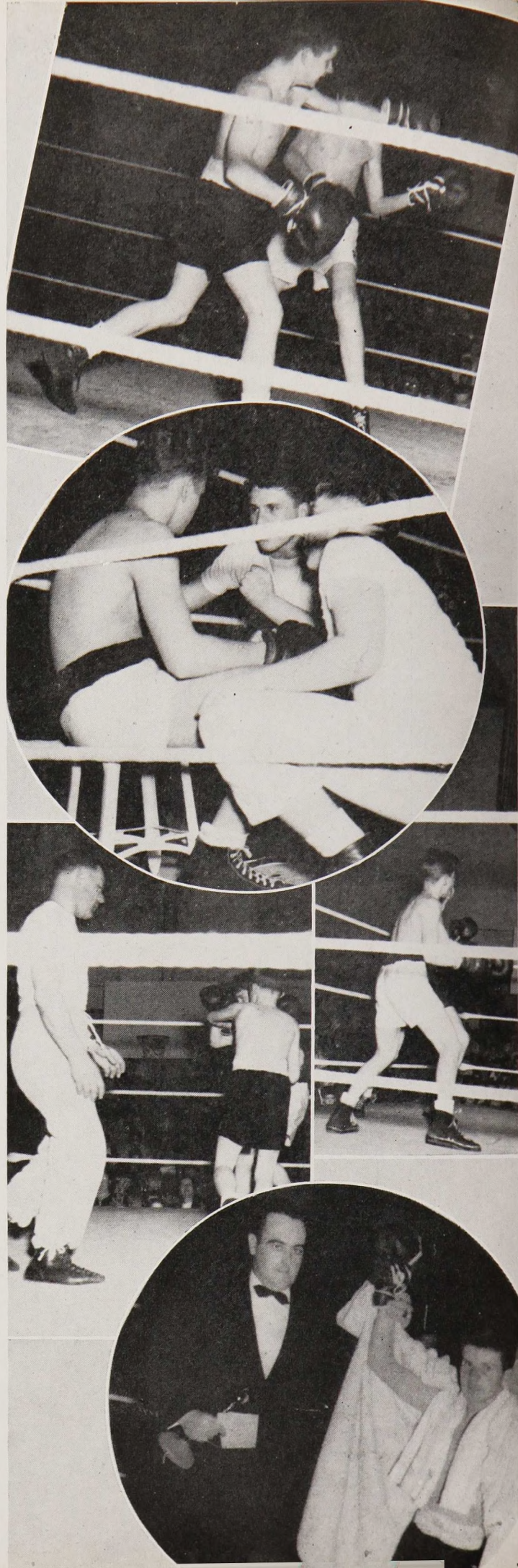

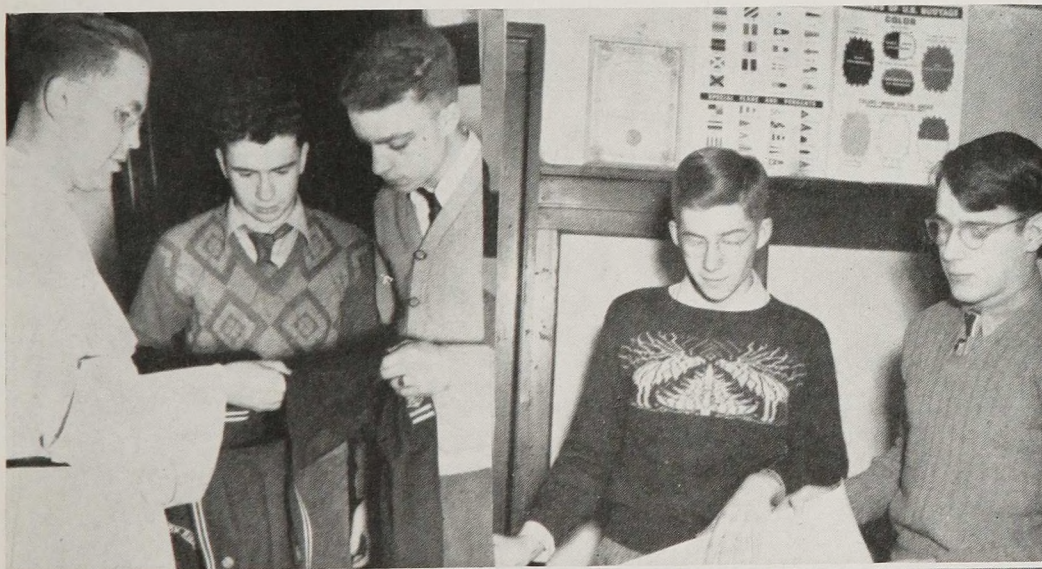

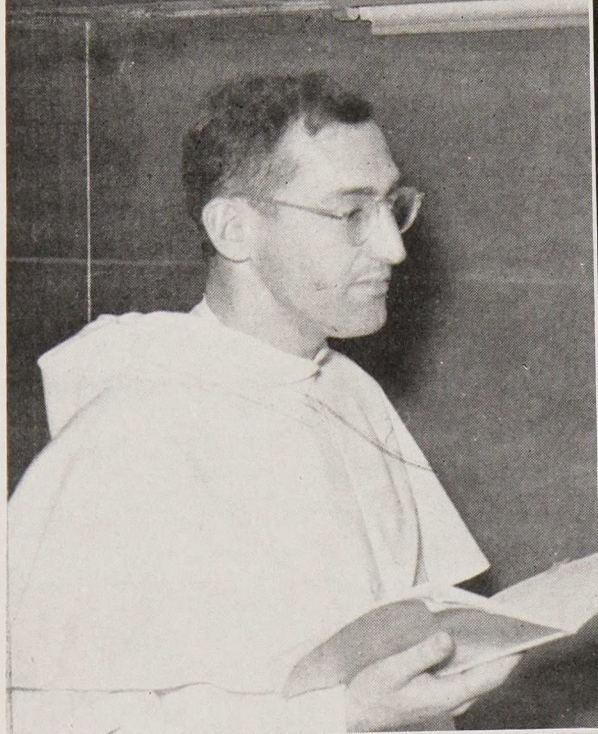

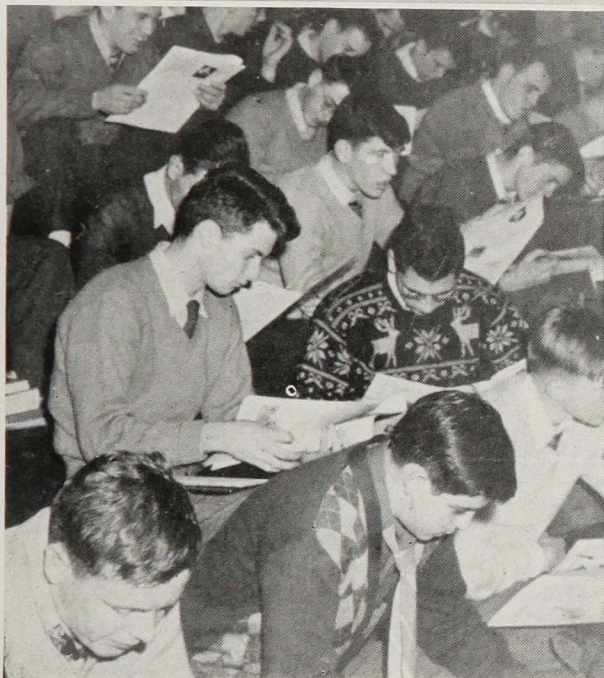

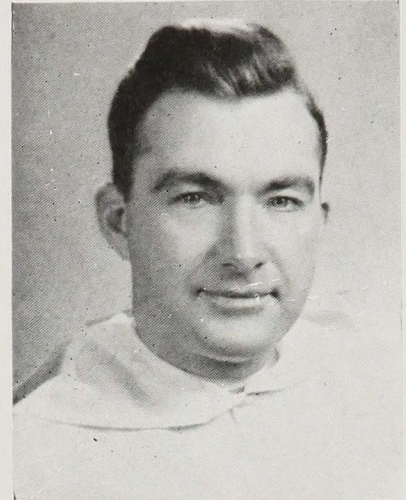


Religious Activities . . .

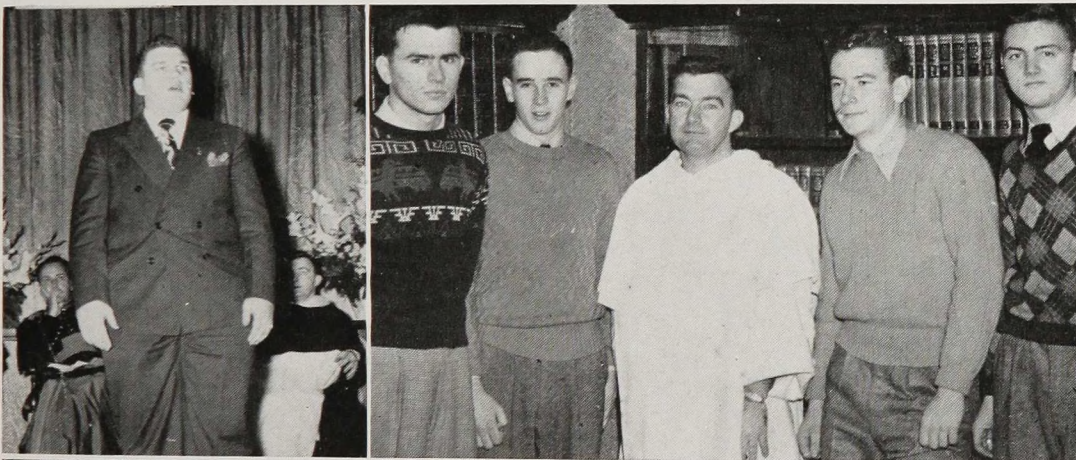

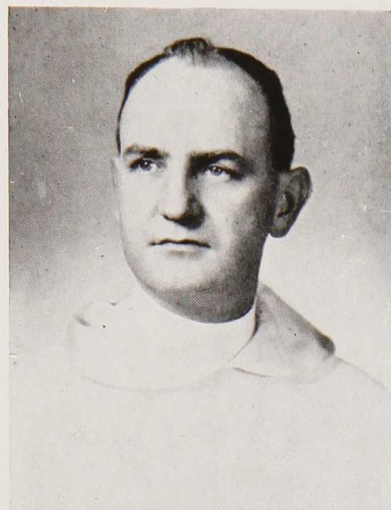

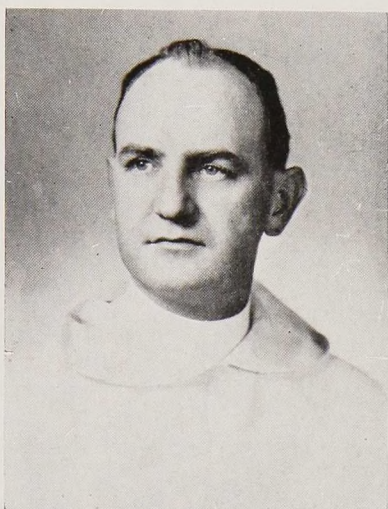
TRAINING AND ENJOYMENT • • •

The Vocational Guidance

During the past two years, the Vocational Guidance Lecture Program at Fenwick High School has developed into an unofficial but regular part of the school's curriculum. Each series, men prominent for achievement in their specialized field, have been asked by representatives of the Fathers' Club, which sponsors the program, to come to Fenwick and explain the functions and facts of their profession to the student assembly. 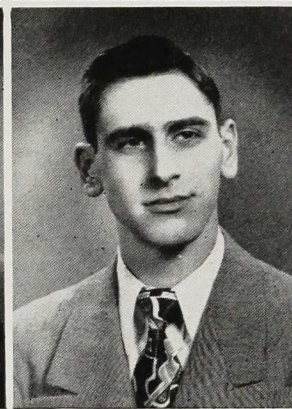
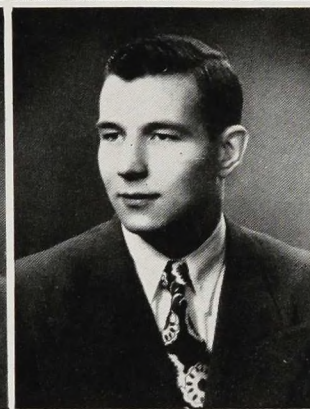
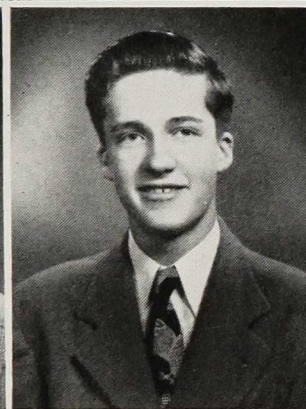
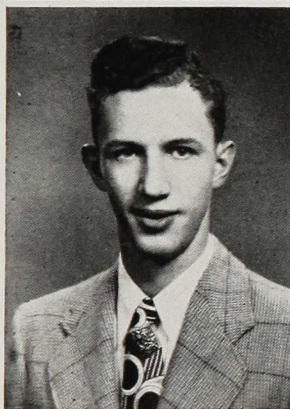
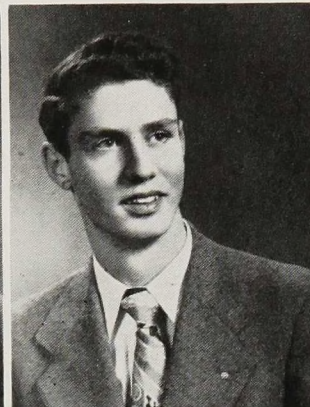
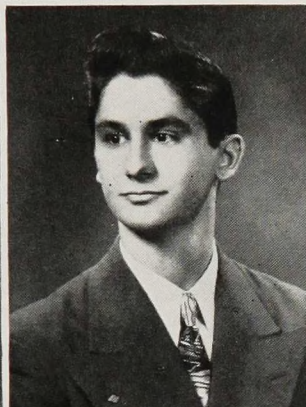
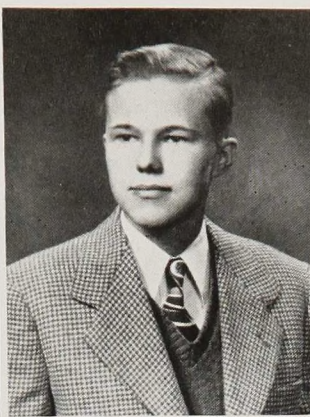
Championships, records, honors and traditions comprise the estate left by the class of 1948 to its successors.
