




PRINCIPAL







Continuing last year's success pattern, Coach Bill Shay piloted the Friar Juniors to a season's record of 19 wins and 7 losses. The lights, after a heart-breaking Catholic league start, finally ended in second place in the South Section but lost in the semi-finals of the playoffs.



From the performances of the Freshmen





INTRAMURALS

Throughout the year the intramural program at Fenwick gives every student a chance to partake in those sports suited to his skills.

In the fall volley ball took over the gym, and 843 boys entered the fray. After the 82 teams formed from this number had been narrowed down to a handful, the championship matches were held after school. The Senior team of the gym class won the title.

On February 13 and 22 at the Circle Bowling Lanes and the Suburban Bowling Lanes, 108 students bowled for the championship of Fenwick's annual tournament. The Senior class swept the tournament. The championship four-man team was composed of R. Sarlitto (485), V. Bonus, (475), F. Trankina (398), and R. Durst (364) for a team total of 1721. With 959 pins, R. Sarlitto and V. Bonus won the doubles title. J. Quinn with 512 pins won the singles championship by 23 pins over his nearest competitor J. Gustafson (489).

On March 24, Intramural Night was held; during the course of the evening the swimming, ping pong, and basketball championships were decided.

In the ping pong singles T. Comparto beat R. Hegberg. R. Hegberg and D. Smith beat P. Scott and J. Murnane in the doubles.

The swimming events were won on the most part by the Juniors with 29 points. The Seniors were second with 18; the Freshmen with 10 for third were closely followed by the Sophomores with 8 points. George Lane, '51, won the 25-yard freestyle event. M. Dunham, '50, won the 25-yard backstroke. The 25-yard breaststroke was won by F. Lolli, '51. George Lane also won the 50-yard freestyle race. The Junior relay team of J. Ryan, F. Lolli, and G. Lane won the 75-yard medley. The 100-yard relay was won by the Senior medley team of W. LaRue, K. Husch, T. Schlicht, and M. Dunham.

In the heavyweight division of the basketball tournament, the Senior team of D. Weaver, J. O'Malley, G. Kamins, R. Doran, J. Wojtys, Ziebell, A. Taddeo, and J. Hanley, came from behind to defeat another senior team 28 to 27 in an overtime and win the title.

The lightweight game was more an open battle. The same team that won the championship last year came back to annex their second title with a 37 to 10 drubbing of a Freshman team. The Senior championship team was composed of E. Fiedler, G. Kunzmann, J. Gustafson, J. O'Connor, J. Ferrone, P. Quirk, L. Harast, J. McDermott, J. Smith, A. O'Reilly.

After more than 400 students had boxed over 375 bouts, Fenwick's 20th Annual Silver Gloves tournament came to a close on March 31

Of the fourteen bouts that evening, six were preliminary non-title fights. During the curtain-raiser, Bob Carbon was defeated by Ed Scullion in a 100-pound class bout. In the 115-pound division, Pete Quirk took a close one from Dick Steinbach. Then the fans watched a pair of 135-pound fighters, Ronald Gross and Ramon Prokoski, overcome Jack Moore and Bob Reynolds. The 145-pound bout brought together the battling Huber brothers with Jim getting the nod over his brother Bill. In the 155-pound class Ray Allen defeated Norb Vallee.

In the first championship bout, Bob Auer and Dick McHale mixed it up in the 90-pound class with Auer coming out on top. The 100-pound champ was Larry Harast who beat Jerry Quinlan for the title. Dick Marshall topped Jerry Bachner in the 115-pound event. Joe Ferrone lost to Dick Zilligan in the 125-pound battle. Wally Digison, a winner from last year, was upset in the 135-pound bracket by Bill Mullen. Ralph Schuler beat 145-pound Bill O'Brien. Larry Duffy was defeated by Terry Moran in the 155-pound bout. Neil Carrothers got the nod in his fight with Bill Brady to become the new heavyweight champion of the school in the last fight of the evening.

Fenwick's Junior and Senior tennis teams, hoping to continue the success enjoyed during the '49 season and also to give Fenwick another championship team, began April 19 to prime for the Catholic League meet. The Seniors, who finished a strong third in the Catholic League last year, featured Ed Fiedler, '50, Ed Vertuno, '50, and Vince Baldassari, '50. This year Dick Feeley, Reg Darkey, Conrad Tuerk, and John Siewers, all '49, the defending Catholic League Junior tennis champions, will bolster the Senior team.

During the track season of 1950 Captain George O'Brien, '50, had a strong team. Running the 660 were W. Hoyne '52, T. Cannon '52, J. Kelly '52, R. Morman '52, and R. Stefain '52. F. Gale '50, H. Murray '51, and E. Fitzgerald '51 ran the 440. Working also in the 220 were Cannon, Murray, Fitzgerald, and Morman. In the 3/4 mile relay were Hoyne and Kelly while O'Brien ran the 1/2 mile relay.


The relay team of O'Brien, Gale, Cannon, and Hoyne was one of the four teams out of the ten Catholic League teams to qualify for the Daily News relays. They turned in a time of 2:40.5 before a crowd of over 20,000, the largest ever to witness an indoor meet in America.

The team ran in the Junior and Senior relays, in the Junior section of the Catholic League meet and in the Senior Catholic League meet.

With 108 golfers competing in the 16th Annual Intramural Golf Tournament, Al "Ace" Eichenold, '50, came out on top with the low score 44-39-83. Three other Seniors, J. Murphy, G. Miller, and T. Pinter, ended up in second place with 86.


The proceeds from Amateur Night amounted to \$520 which was sent to the Dominican Missions in Boyce, Louisiana.

Completing its twentieth successful year with a fine school activities record, the Fenwick Band maintained a full schedule, as in past years, with its repertory of marches, overtures and current popular music. 



BUILDING FUND



To the winner, a \$25,000 home

In November 1949, the Reverend William D. VanRooy, O.P., moderator of the Fenwick Building Fund Drive, announced that returns from the successful September house raffle had supplied the remaining \$100,000 of the \$400,000 quota needed for the construction of a new school addition. The drive was started in the summer of 1945 to raise the necessary funds for expanding the facilities of Fenwick in order to accommodate the rising enrollment. Father VanRooy was appointed by the Very Reverend Peter O'Brien, O.P., then Provincial of the Province of St. Albert the Great, and Mr. Hugh E. Mulligan offered his services to act as chairman.

On March 1, 1950, the leveling of the old Priory houses was begun, the new Priory building having been finished the previous November, and work on the new school building itself started May 1, with its date of completion set for some time late next fall.

According to Architect Lester D. White's plans, the addition will consist of a series of class rooms on the third floor, a two-story auditorium, and a combination cafeteria and study hall in the basement.

The Camera Club, Fenwick's largest extra-curricular activity




The members of the club participate in French skits (for their own amusement), and pass their free time reading various French



NAZARETH CONFERENCES

Three Nazareth Conferences were sponsored by the Religion Department this year at Fenwick in cooperation with the Cardinal in bringing the problems of modern youth before the eyes of their parents and showing the Catholic outlook on these difficulties.

The important subject of vocational guidance in the Catholic home was discussed at the first Nazareth Conference held on Monday night, October 24. The Reverend Gordon F. Walter, O.P., Principal of Fenwick; the Reverend John Snider, S.J., of Loyola University Guidance Center; and the Reverend John Kennelly of St. Angela Parish were the speakers that evening.

The question of "Who Is Responsible for the Character Training of Youth" was discussed at the second Nazareth Conference held January 30, in the gym. The Reverend Dominic Brady, O.P., of Fenwick, explained the school's responsibility in this matter, while the Reverend Eugene F. Riordan, of St. Catherine Parish spoke about the role that the Church plays, and Mr. Edward W. Dunne, of the Fenwick Fathers' Club, presented the parents' point of view on the serious topic.

A repeat performance of a topic discussed four years ago was held by popular request at the third Nazareth Conference March 27. "The Problem of Youth Entertainment" was the topic. The Reverend James M. 


For the benefit and convenience of the students, Mass has been said every morning in the new and comparatively large chapel in the priory, and confessions have been heard every afternoon after school.



The most ambitious project of the Sea Scouts' past season was the constructing of a "canuyak" — a combination between a canoe and a kayak.


In the near future the seven members of the Sea Scouts plan to acquire a surplus ship from the Navy upon which all phases of seamanship may be studied in great detail.
