
Mr. Chmiel views the rules at Fenwick as an all-or-nothing-at-all situation which is a definite change from last year. "There should be one set of rules being enforced equally among all. If you try to take one rule out of context, it just doesn't work." And the poet said that this makes all the difference.

**HE**, who thrusts us out into

the cold for fire drills, makes us cut our hair for appearances and demands our quiet in the lunch room is Mr. Edward Ludwig. However, when we decended upon his office for this interview, hoping to trip him into an admission that the hair rule exists for its own sake, he tripped us up with some very good and heretofore unsuspected reasons for the rules.


air. So, maybe, our students are being ecologically minded with their long hair, but unfortunately many don't bother to wash out the dirt they are taking from the air. And another

Father Similik is to the teachers as Mr. Ludwig is to the students.






Father Gerald J. McGreevy is the person responsible for the actual running of the school. It is a difficult job and he is aided by Fr. Similik and Mr. Ludwig. Fr. McGreevy thinks that the school offers a good "sense of tradition and belonging." He was a teacher here in 1968 and would still "rather be in the classroom," working with the students. "But," he tells us, "when people come to the school they expect to find a man in an office."

Father Andrew K. Kolzow is the president, make no mistake about that. But what does he do in this role? "We found that many things had to be done in addition to the day to day running of the school ... was almost too much for one man to handle." So when he became president in February of 1971, Fr. Kolzow became responsible for representing Fenwick in the community and also the Dominican Provence. He is also in charge of "The Fenwick Scholarship and Development Fund" which reduces a students tuition by about \$250.

- SO LONG, IT HAS BEEN FUN


Over this past summer, the Fenwick priests have moved from their home adjoining the school to the Priory of Sts. Dominic and Thomas, commonly named the House of Studies. The priests aren't too ecstatic about the move because of the impersonalness. However, moving back would be a step down to less sumptuous rooms.


The House of Studies, with its 150 rooms, is still over half empty. The Religion Department has been putting this space to good use. Under Father Ostdiek's direction, weekend retreats have been held for seniors (see page 10).

This supplies the school with much needed room. The plan for the Priory itself was to move all the Department rooms and all student extracurricular activities there. The Departments have moved, and now the teachers have one of the best lounges in the country, but only three activities have rooms there. They are the same three that previously had rooms in the pit; the Newspaper, the Student Council and the Yearbook. They are not really satisfied. The smallness of the rooms (they were given two non-adjoining rooms) and the fact that no student is allowed there during school hours severely limits usefulness.

But what about the other students? When the entire senior class was polled, over 80% said that they did not know where the Priory was or its use.

So right now, most of the priory goes unused. Of course there are the usual suggestions of independent study programs and a student lounge but little is expected to come of them because of lack of funds.


Mr. Arellano graduated from Mac-Murry College in 1972. He received his B.A. in Speech and Public Communications.


Mrs. Spina received her B.A. in French from Northern Illinois University in 1972.




Fr. West has received three degrees. He has an A.B. in History (1949), M.A. in Philosophy (1953) and a S.T.D. in Theology (1957).




# EINSTEIN FAILED THE ENTRANCE EXAM AT POLYTECHNIC SCHOOL.



For those of you too young to remember him, Fr. P. is Fenwick's symbol of absolute authority



Maybe that is what the guys really want when they cry out for Fr. P. Maybe they just want to be wanted.





















I don't know how seriously the feeling that pervades sports affects us, but I think it does work on our subconscious and could eventually get us carried away.







Fifteen starters returning combined with an undefeated freshman team, makes next year look especially hopeful.





















#### **Our Friars close 4-4**


Chicago Circle campus during the Christmas holidays, the heavies placed fourth after losing their last two games by only a few points.



Matt attributed the team's success to working together, individual pride and the coaching of Mr. John Polka.







## National Catholic swimming champions

## Catholic league joins the I.H.S.A.







The major sports, football and basketball will be hurt in that football will have to drop spring and summer practice, and basketball will have to drop its junior league.



## Lithuanian Club





The members include Scott Simms, Mike Fencl, Tom Montes, Tony Stankus, George Burns, Mike Soriano and Norman Laskowski.








#### DEBATE

## JUNIOR CLASS PRESIDENT




# Math Dept.



Fr. Jordan McGrath was brought in from Omaha to teach Junior and Senior Honors Math and Science and Environment. His hobbies include astronomy and photography.





## The C.T.A.

#### OR "WHY ARE YOU LATE?"

Although many students at Fenwick ride the C.T.A. to school, few know the origins of the system which they often blame for their tardiness. In these pages will be a short history of the C.T.A. and its accomplishments, a pictorial sampling of various types of C.T.A. equipment, (past and present), and lastly, a look at reactions to the C.T.A. by students, with comments from one C.T.A. — experienced faculty member.

In 1945 the Chicago Transit Authority was formed to take over operations of the Chicago Surface Lines and the Chicago Rapid Transit Company, the former having been in receivership since 1927 and the latter since 1932. Thus a system of unified, publicly owned transit replaced inefficient, competitive operation of privately owned systems.

On October 1, 1947, C.T.A. became an operating entity. It was during this time that the Authority had instituted its modernization and replacement program, providing for 4,256 new vehicles to replace deteriorated equipment of its bankrupt predecessors. This initial program was completed in 1959 and since that time C.T.A. has been buying additional vehicles for replacement purposes (though some of you may not believe it).

In addition, the C.T.A. eliminated wasteful competition between surface system (streetcars and buses) and rapid transit system (the "L" and subway) and closed many lightly-used stations on the rapid transit.

Another major economy move was the C.T.A.'s complete change-over from streetcars to buses, accomplished gradually through the 1950's. The last streetcar was operated on June 21, 1958 (on Wentworth Avenue).

On February 25, 1951, the Milwaukee Ave. Subway was opened, replacing the elevated line and eliminating some congestion on the Loop "L". It was on October 1, 1952, that the C.T.A. took over operation of the Chicago Motor Coach Company, which at that time operated 595 buses.

The last of the approximately fifty-year-old wood-steel rapid transit cars was retired on Dec. 1, 1957. The C.T.A. had acquired a total of 1166 of these cars from the Chicago Rapid Transit Company.

Expressway-median rapid transit was pioneered on June 22, 1958, with the opening of the Congress Expressway line, replacing the former Garfield Park elevated. The new line was much faster and served as a fine example of coordinated, high-speed rapid transit that has attracted the interest of transit officials around the world.

Another major project was the elevation of the Lake Street rapid transit route on Oct. 28, 1962. As some of you may recall, the Lake St. "L" ran along the ground from a point just west of Laramie Ave. in Chicago to Marengo St., Forest Park. In addition to the problems of being a trolley operation, the line was plagued with delays which occurred due to its twenty-two grade crossings. The elevation considerably reduced travel time on the route.

In 1963, 180 air-conditioned rapid transit cars were ordered by the C.T.A. This was the first time in the United States there had been designed and built air-conditioned rapid transit units from the start. These were delivered from mid-to-late 1964, replacing 200 cars, forty to fifty years old (one is pictured). These old cars fully equipped the Lake route and provided some rush-hour service on the Douglas line.

Throughout the 1960's, the C.T.A. bought 1,378 "New Look" diesel buses, ten of which were experimental air-conditioned units built in 1965. It was also in 1965 that Governor Otto H. Kerner signed a bill to

reimburse the C.T.A. for transporting children and students (including Fenwick students) at a reduced fare.


Work on the Kennedy and Dan Ryan extensions was begun in 1967. These projects were funded by the federal government and the city of Chicago. The Dan Ryan line opened Sept. 28, 1969 and the Kennedy line Feb. 1, 1970.

In 1972 the Authority instituted the first phase (\$80 million) of its \$122 million capital improvements program, completely funded by federal and state governments. (It should be noted here that this money can only be used for capital improvements and not for operating expenses. This is why the C.T.A. has had such serious financial troubles.) In this program, the Authority has received 525 new air-conditioned buses in 1972 with an additional 525 coming in 1973. In addition, the C.T.A. is to receive 100 air-conditioned rapid transit cars in 1974. Other projects include structure renewal, station modernization, etc.

In Chicago, transit facilities are such that wherever you are located, you are within three blocks of C.T.A. service. In addition, many adjacent suburbs are served by the C.T.A., although there are hopes that the Chicago Transit Authority may expand its services even more, serving suburbia and the city more perfectly and continuing to modernize its equipment and facilities. Chicago has had many great accomplishments in transportation as it continues to strive for a coordinated system of rapid transit of grade-separated right-of-way served by a system of feeder bus lines.

#### A FORMER BUS DRIVER?


